- 3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility:-
- 1. This institution encourages the faculty and the students to take up activities related to extension activities and social responsibilities.
- 2. Apart from the regular work in the college, a majority of faculty members actively involve themselves in social activities through NCC, NSS, Rovers and Rangers, Parents Teachers association, Clubs and Societies etc. Outreach activities such as: Army Wing of NCC, the college won First Position in Cadets Drill Competition of Army's Attachment Camp at Solan. At Shahtalai, in combined Annual Training Camp, College bagged overall first position and SUO Anjana Thakur was declared the best Commander. Four Cadets participated in National Integration Camp held at Mumbai, on 15th August and 26th January. Cadets of the College participated in "Clean India Campaign" at Kullu and also organized a Blood Donation Camp. Under Air Wing of NCC, six cadets participated in All India Vayu Sainik Camp at Bengaluru, Cadet Duni Chand participated in Republic Day Parade. Seventeen Cadets participated in Pre Vayu Sainik Camp at Chandigarh Air Force Station, and Cadet Aditya Jamwal won Silver Medal in shooting there. Cadets participated in Tobacco Prohibitory Day on 30th May and also in International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking which was celebrated on 26th June. They also participated in the International Disaster Re-discussion Day on 18th October. The cadets observed World Aids Day on 1st September. A Vigilance Awareness Week was organized from 9th January to 11th January. Cadets contributed socially by taking the challenge of Village Cleanliness campaign at village Kais. The Cadets distributed sweets among Blind Students of Blind School, Kullu. They also performed Traffic Control Duty and Collection of Red Cross Fund for the Red Cross Society.
- 3. Under NSS activities, a seminar was organized entitled," NSS Purpose and Significance" on July 11^{th} . Fifty Volunteers of the college donated blood in collaboration with local Rotary Club. The cadets courageously organized a Camp for De-weeding of the Cannabis on July 19^{th} and also destroyed "Gajar Ghas" around the Bhootnath Temple in Kullu. The volunteers organized a colourful Cultural Programme on 24^{th} September. They also organized a seminar on Child Labour on October 3^{rd} . In the name of Disaster Relief Fund, volunteers collected rupees 5100 and also organized Pulse Polio Rally on December 28^{th} . Appropriate to say that Village Badah was adopted by the NSS Volunteers, in order to develop this area.
- 4. Under Rovers and Rangers, an active participation was made in State Level Function. A Cleanliness Campaign was launched at Bijli Mahadev Temple on 29th July. The volunteers also made their presence felt by participating in Water Sports Training Camp and in the same camp, Ranger Anjana was adjudged the Best Swimmer. Finally, twenty Rovers and Rangers helped in controlling the Traffic in the International Festival of Dushehra at Kullu from 3rd October to 9th October, 2014.
