From 25<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> November, cadets participated in Traffic Control Week with the help of police department. The cadets also participated in NCC Day Parade on 24<sup>th</sup> December.

Rupees 2100/- was collected on the occasion of Flag Day by the cadets. On 13<sup>th</sup> October, the International Disaster Management Day was observed by the NCC cadets in which various ways to tackle the disasters were learnt.

Under NCC Air Wing, cadet Dabe Ram and Cadet Gaurav participated in Stimulator Flying Camp at Jullundhar from 17<sup>th</sup> July to 25th July. Seven cadets participated in 9 days Pre-DCAT Camp at Dalhousie from 19<sup>th</sup> September to 28<sup>th</sup> September. Three cadets participated in 12 Wing Air Force Station at Chandigarh from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> October. Sergeant Vikas Jamwal and Reena Thakur won gold and bronze medals in shooting at Pre Vayu Sainik Camp at Patiala from 6<sup>th</sup> to 12th October. In All India Vayu Sainik Camp at Bengaluru from 30<sup>th</sup> October to 9<sup>th</sup> November, cadet Vikas Jamwal won a bronze medal, Cadet Govind Singh and Cadet Khem Chand attended Pre-RD Camp at Chandigarh. Cadet Yog Raj was selected for State Republic Day Camp at Shimla. Bikram and Dabe Ram were selected for Air Force Academy Camp at Hyderabad from 21 October to 2<sup>nd</sup> November. The cadets collected an amount of rupees 1796/ on Teachers Day.
