

### Criterion-wise Evaluative Report

#### **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS.**

#### 1.1 Curricular Design and Development

- 1.1.1 Vision and mission of the Institution: The college aims at holistic development of the students so as to make them employable and self-reliant as well as responsible member of the society. The main objective of the college is not only to impart knowledge to the students, but also to instill human values in them.
  The information in this regards is published in the college prospects every year and also available on the college website.
- 1.1.2 Keeping in view the guidelines issued by the University under the Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) system, a detailed time table is made according to the credit hours allotted to different major, minor, compulsory, skill based/General Interest and Hobby courses. Further, it is split into three components Lectures, Tutorials (seminar/ assignment/ quiz etc.) and Practicals (where required). The teachers have to cover the syllabi within the stipulated time. Students are assessed through an evaluation system comprising of Comprehensive Continuous Assessment (CCA) and End Semester Examination (ESE).
- **1.1.3** Govt. college of Teacher Education Dharamshala H.P. organizes Induction Training Programmes and In-service Programmes for the teachers. These programmes have focus on ICT Application, Management of different activities etc. which helps in improving the teaching practices.
- **1.1.4** For effective curricular delivery, the institution organizes workshops, short training programmes, presentations related to IT, etc for the faculty. The support material like library, INFLIBNET Lab etc. are available in the college.
- 1.1.5 The constant communication with the university is made through E-mail, fax etc. besides the conventional modes of communication in order to remain updated about the guidelines issued by the H.P. University for ensuring effective implementation of the curriculum. Senior faculty members suggest the necessary changes in the

curriculum, whenever the university invites suggestion for the modification of the curriculum.

- **1.1.6** Senior faculty members are included on the board of studies by the University from time to time. They suggest the necessary changes in the curriculum to the H.P. University, which is the apex body for designing and improving the curriculum, on the basis of review as well as feedback provided by the stakeholders i.e. students, teachers and parents.
- **1.1.7** No, the institution does not develop curriculum for any of the courses as the affiliating university does not authorize the institution to do so.
- **1.1.8** Regular meetings are convened by the head of the institution with the departmental heads for getting information and ensuring that the teaching process involves lectures, and tutorials including quiz, seminars, assignment and minor tests for the CCA.

#### 1.2 Academic Flexibility

- **1.2.1** No certificate or diploma courses are offered by the institution .However, skill based courses are offered under the RUSA system.
- **1.2.2** Yes, under the RUSA system, students have been given the opportunity to have a degree with "Emphasis" or "Double Major". For degree in Major with "Emphasis" and degree in Double Major, a student will have to take additional elective courses and accumulate at least 15 and 30 credits in excess respectively.
- **1.2.3** For keeping pace with the development in education worldwide, the RUSA system provides flexibility as the students have considerable freedom in choosing courses for their skill development, academic mobility and improved potential for employability.

In the UG programme, besides the core courses of the Major Subject, a student has to choose a combination of two Minor (Elective) subjects out of the available subject combinations, as well as some General and Skill based Compulsory courses, and General Interest & Hobby courses. The list of various major with minor subject combinations in various streams viz Humanities, Science and commerce is as follows:

1.2.4 The college offers two self-financing degree courses – BCA from session 2008-2009 onwards and BBA from session 2010-11 onwards each with intake of 40 students. These courses are affiliated to the H.P. University and the admission is given on the basis of merit in the qualifying 10+2 examination. The H.P. University designs the curricula for these courses while the fee structure is decided by the Directorate of Higher Education (for subsidized as well as non- subsidized seats). The teachers are engaged in accordance with the norms prescribed by the UGC and the salary is paid on period basis.

Besides these courses, the institution had also been offering Tourism and Travel Management as an elective subject till 2013 under self-financing scheme. However,

from 2014 onwards it is being offered as a Major as well as an elective subject under self-financing scheme with a maximum intake of 80 and 160 students respectively. The admission criteria, fee structure etc. are the same as mentioned above.

#### 1.2.5 No

**1.2.6** No, the affiliating university does not provide the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and distance mode of education for the student to choose the courses/combination of their choice.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

- **1.3.1** For supplementing university's curriculum and ensuring the integration of the academic programmes and institution's goals and objectives, the institution organizes seminars, lectures and talks by the academicians having expertise in different fields and provides opportunities to the students to participate in the co-curricular activities like NSS,NCC, Rovers and Rangers, sports and cultural programmes. All these programmes help in bringing forth the innate qualities and imbibing values among the students for their holistic development.
  - 1.3.2 To enrich and organize the curriculum for enhancing the experiences of the students, different departments as well as the career counseling cell organize workshops, seminars and expert lectures. Moreover, lab experiments, field studies, project work are also essential part of many courses which help the students to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market.
- 1.3.3 The course on environmental studies is a compulsory qualifying course for the students of all streams. The course helps in integrating the cross cutting issues like climate change, pollution etc. into the curriculum. The college Women Cell, the Red Ribbon Club, the Eco Club and the Cultural Committee, at times organize lectures and discussions on issues like human rights, environment, gender etc. besides holding literary as well as fine arts competitions to sensitize the students on the aforesaid issues.
- **1.3.4** For the holistic development of students, the college provides many value added and enrichment programmes:
  - The NSS, the NCC and the Rovers and Rangers with an overall objective of "Service to the community" help in strengthening the character of the students.
  - Beside courses like BCA, BBA, BJMC, T&T Management to enhance the
    employability of the students; many skill based compulsory, and general interest and
    hobby courses under RUSA system are also helpful in increasing the prospects of
    employment and giving the students better career options.

- Community orientation is provided by the NSS, the NCC, the Rovers and Rangers, the Red Ribbon Club, the Woman Cell and the Community Service Cell.
- **1.3.5** The feedback from the parents in the PTA meetings and sometimes the suggestions by the SCA members are forwarded to the affiliating university by the faculty members on the Board of Studies of the university.
- **1.3.6** The Principal convenes the meetings of Heads of the concerned Departments and Advisory Committees for the evaluation of the enrichment programmes .The suggestions and feedback taken help in making the programmes more effective.

#### 1.4 Feedback System

- **1.4.1** Senior faculty members of the college are on the board of studies of the H.P. University who help in the designing and development of the curriculum prepared by the university.
- **1.4.2** There exists a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and other stake holders on curriculum. The feedback sheets are regularly maintained on college website which are printed and discussed in the staff meetings and the implementable suggestions are executed.
- 1.4.3 The BBA course was started during the session 2010-11 to open more career avenues for the students and also with a purpose of infusing business management skills in the youth of Kullu valley. Journalism and Mass Communication, Tourism and Travel Management and Physical Education are offered as major subjects under RUSA system. Beside these courses, MA Economics has also been started from the session 2011-12.

#### CRITERION-II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and profile

**2.1.1** The college brings out its prospectus cum handbook of information every year well before the commencement of admission process outlining the details of eligibility criteria and the admission process for various courses. The college website also contains detailed information about the same.

The dates for admission as notified by the H.P. University are widely publicized through the regional newspapers or the local television channels. For ensuring transparency in the admission process, the merit lists for various courses are prepared strictly according to the eligibility criteria after careful scrutiny of the admission forms by the respective committees. The lists of the selected candidates to various courses as per the number of seats available are displayed on the college notice boards

along with their percentage of marks on the dates specified by the university and the students are asked to deposit the dues by the notified dates. For the vacancies in different courses, the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> lists are also prepared and displayed in the likewise manner on the dates specified by the university.

**2.1.2** In UG under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), the number of seats available for every major subject has been fixed while the departmental committees of the college decide the elective courses to be offered and the size of the class as per the availability of faculty and infrastructure. The students are admitted in an elective course on a first-come first-served basis with a limit set.

The admission is done to these courses as well as to the self-financing programmes of BBA and BCA under RUSA system on the basis of merit in 10+2 examination and the minimum percentage of marks required for admission to UG courses is as given below:

Pass in the 10+2 examination conducted by the HP board of school education or an examination conducted by the various bodies accepted as equivalent thereto by the HP University is eligible for admission in the 1<sup>st</sup> semester of the UG programme.

PG courses in English and Economics have 30 seats each. These seats are filled on the basis of weighted merit percentage calculated as follows:

(Marks obtained in TDC\* + Total marks obtained in English/Economics - TDC) x 100

Maximum marks allotted in TDC + 300

\*TDC = Three-year Degree Course

The eligible candidate who has passed Honours course in English/Economics is given 10% weightage in addition to his/her weighted merit percentage.

Reservation of seats in various courses is decided by the roaster of HP University Shimla.

#### **2.1.3** Undergraduate Programme

**2.1.4** No, the institution does not have any mechanism to review the admission process and student profile annually. The admission process is completed according to the rules and regulations framed by the HPU and the Directorate of higher Education.

**2.1.5** Keeping in view the reservation policy of the Government, the admissions are made according to the roster of reservation provided by the HPU so that various courses of study are open to all persons, irrespective of race, creed, caste or class.

#### • SC/ST

15% and 7.5% of the seats are available to bona fide Himachali SC and ST candidates respectively. Upper age limit for SC/ST candidates for admission to undergraduate programme is 25 years. In case of PG admissions, there is provision of relaxation of 5% marks in minimum eligibility and the upper age limit which is 29 years for SC and ST candidates.

#### OBC

Govt. provides scholarships to the OBC candidates whose family income falls below the ceiling fixed by the State/Central Govt.

#### • Women

No tuition fee is charged from the girl-students. In addition to the number of seats available in each major course under RUSA system, one extra seat is provided for a single girl-child, which is also filled on merit basis.

#### • Differently-abled

3% of the seats are reserved in each course for differently abled candidates .

#### • Economically weaker sections.

Scholarships to candidates of economically weaker sections are provided by the state Govt.

#### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- **2.2.1** The only provision for the sight impaired students is the provision of writers during the examination as per the university rules.
- **2.2.2** At present there is no system to assess the knowledge & skills of the students before the commencement of the programme. However, before the introduction of the RUSA system in 2013 there used to be an entrance test for admission to the BCA course.
- **2.2.3** The class tests, assignments, discussion as well as mid-term tests help in distinguishing a slow and an advance learner. Accordingly, guidance is provided to them in the tutorials.
- **2.2.4** Besides lectures and seminars on issues like environment, gender, human rights etc., various competitions like debates, declamation, slogan writing, poster making are held on the aforesaid issues on different occasions in order to sensitize the staff and the students by different cells and clubs of the institution.
- 2.2.5 The advance learners are identified on the basis of their performance in the class tests as well as their participation in the interactive sessions in the class. Accordingly guidance and study material is provided to them by the teachers concerned. Moreover, they are told about the various sites on the net from where they can get good study

material for respective courses and they are guided to make use of the e-library facility.

2.2.6 The college collects the data of all the students about their past academic performance and their social and economic status at the time of admission (authenticated from original documents). Further, the information on their current academic performance is gathered from their CCA. Scholarship is given to the needy including SC, ST, OBC candidates for financial assistance as per the Govt. norms. Special guidance is provided to the slow learners and differently abled students.

#### 2.3 Teaching learning process

- **2.3.1** A tentative calendar of activities curricular, co-curricular as well as midterm test schedule made before the commencement of the academic session is published in the college prospectus for the information of all stake holders. All the teaching, co-curricular and evaluation activities are held according to this schedule. End Semester Examination and Evaluation schedule is decided by the affiliating university and followed by the affiliated colleges.
- **2.3.2** IQAC of the college works for qualitative improvement in different activities of the college as it formulates the new plans and strategies for improvement of teaching learning process. The cell also and monitors and evaluates them.
- 2.3.2 For making learning more students centric, induction and in service training programmes are organized by H.P. Govt. for teachers at Govt. College of Teachers Education, Dharamshala. Moreover, teachers attend refresher courses, seminars, workshops for the development of various skills organized by various academic staff colleges across India.
- 2.3.4 The institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students through interactive and analytic methods used in teaching-learning process, as well as by debates, declamations, discussions held in curricular/co-curricular activities. Besides the fine arts competitions, theatre, poetry competitions, etc the college magazine is also a major platform to bring out the talent inherent in the students.
- 2.3.5 The faculty can make use of the e-learning resources in the library besides consulting the titles available in various sections of the library. The teachers have the facility to browse the INFLIBNET. Moreover, there is a well equipped IT Laboratory with internet facility for the use of the faculty. They can also make use of the ICT classrooms at times.
- **2.3.6** Students can have free access to the latest information through newspapers, magazines, journals available in the library. They can also make use of the internet facility available in the IT lab and the college library.

  Moreover, workshops, seminers and lectures are also organized for the banefit of the
  - Moreover, workshops, seminars and lectures are also organized for the benefit of the students and well as the faculty members. The latter, besides making use of the

aforesaid facilities, update their knowledge by attending workshops, seminars etc. organized by at National & International levels.

**2.3.7** At the entry level to UG courses, the candidates are provided academic guidance by the career guidance and placement cell about the different courses and the subject combinations available in the college enabling them to choose the courses that suit them.

Moreover, a number of counseling sessions are held during the academic session in which experts from different fields counsel the students regarding career opportunities and preparation for various competitive exams.

- **2.3.8** Although, classrooms with ICT facilities are not available in every department, the faculty members are encouraged to make use of the available classrooms in order to make teaching-learning process interesting. Interactive practices like seminars, debates and group discussions make the process student centric. Students of many courses like BCA, BBA and BJMC have to undertake project work also.
- **2.3.9** Besides consulting the titles available in various sections of the library, the faculty and the students can have access to wide range of material through INFLIBNET.
- **2.3.10** No, the institution does not face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar.

#### 2.4 Teacher Quality

**2.4.1** The faculty members are selected by the Himachal Pradesh Service Commission through a screening test of the eligible candidates followed by personally test. The HP Govt. appoints the selected candidates. At present, there are well qualified and competent teachers in almost all the departments of the colleges.

- **2.4.4** Provision of special leave for attending seminar, workshops, conference etc. Study leave of two years is granted for the doctoral research and ten days special casual leave in a year is provided to attend seminar/conferences
- **2.4.5** None.
- **2.4.6** No formal mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students and internal peers has been introduced by the institution except in self financing courses like BCA where every year teacher's ability is evaluated by students.

#### 2.5 Evaluation process and Reforms

**2.5.1** The information regarding the evaluation process including the CCA and end semester examination is published in the prospectus. Changes and modifications in the process are also brought to the notice of the faculty who in turn explain the evaluation method in their respective classes.

- **2.5.2** The major evaluation reform of university adopted by institution is the introduction of CCA in UG under RUSA system and introduction of internal assessment in PG courses
- **2.5.3** As per the university regulations under RUSA system, the institution ensures and monitors that 50% student evaluation is done on the basis of midterm tests, attendance, seminars/ assignment etc. and the 50% evaluation is done by the university through ESE.

In case of PG courses also there is provision of 20% of students' evaluation on the basis of class attendance and class tests/ seminars/ assignments and the rest is done through the university examination at the end of the semester.

#### 2.5.4

- a) Continuous comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) accounting for 50% of the final grade that a student gets in a course has following components.
  - i) 2 Midterm tests, each carrying 15 Marks
  - ii) Classroom attendance carrying 5 marks. The allotment of the marks is as given below:

> 75% but < 80%	1 Marks
> 80% but < 85%	2 Marks
> 85% but < 90%	3 Marks
> 90% but < 95%	4 Marks
> 95%	5 Marks

- iii) The remaining 15 marks of the CCE are awarded on the basis of seminars/assignment/Quiz etc.
- b) End Seminar Examination (ESE)

50% of the final grade of the students in a course on the basis of an end semester examination is conducted the HPU as per the schedule notified.

The details of marks obtained by the students in the CSE are sent to the university and the marks obtained in ESE are combined with them. Grades for each courses are decided accordingly. Relative grading is done by the office of the COE HPU for each course class in all colleges. For each student, the grade point average (GPA) and the cumulated grade point average (CGPA) is also determined by the aforesaid office.

2.5.5 Teachers evaluate the students' performance in the interactive session, seminars, class assignments etc. as well as through the midterm tests. Their answer sheets are shown to them and the result are communicated to them in their respective classes as well as by displaying them on the notice board of the college. Students can also seek the information regarding their performance in the mid-term tests from the controller of examination of the college.

- 2.5.6 The total minimum credits required for an under graduate degree programme is 120. The teachers explain the credit system to the students, along with its components and it is ensured that there is provision of core, elective, compulsory and general interest and hobby course in the institution as per the requirement of the students enabling them to accumulate these credits.
- 2.5.7 The students have the right to make an appeal to the principal against any component of CCE evaluation. The appeal can be placed before the grievance redressal committee which decides the matter.

For the re-evaluation of answer scripts of the end-semester examination, a student can apply to the university.

#### 2.6 Student performance and learning outcome

- **2.6.1** Holistic development of the students as well as making them responsible member of the society are the major aims of the institution which are clearly stated in the prospectus of the college. The students not only gain knowledge for employability but also imbibe value and traits for becoming good and responsible human beings.
- **2.6.2** The institution monitors progress and performance of the students through various components of CCE like tutorials, practicals, seminars, and midterm examination and communicates the result to the students in their respective classes and by displaying them on the college notice board.

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The college has shown consistently good results in Himachal University examination. In most of the programmes the pass percentage of the college is higher than than the university pass percebtage where as in others it is comparable to the university pass persentage.

- **2.6.3** The teaching, learning and assessment strategies are structured according to the guidelines provided by the HPU and are integrated with the co-curricular activities at regular interval so as to achieve the goal of holistic development.
- **2.6.4** The students get academic guidance as per their interests by the career guidance and placement cell of the college. For the enhancement of the social and economic relevance of the courses offered in addition to the project work, educational tours, community service, seminars, workshops and expert lectures in different fields are organized by the institution.

#### CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

#### 3.1 Promotion of Research

- **3.1.1** The institution has no research centre of its own however many faculty members of different departments of the college are engaged in research at individual level.
- **3.1.2** The college does not have its own research committee. The affiliated college has to follow the guidelines of the affiliating university. The College is planning to establish its own research cell to develop the linkage with leading national and international research centers and to encourage the participation of the faculty members in active research.
- **3.1.3** The College has UGC Cell to promote and to monitor the ongoing research schemes and projects. The college encourages its faculty to prepare the research proposals and forwards such proposal to the funding agency. Research provides research facility through library resources such as books, journals, e-library and INFLIBNET facility.
- **3.1.4** To develop scientific temper, research culture and aptitude the students are encouraged to make use of existing facilities like science labs, IT lab, library, e-library, e-books, etc and to participation in Seminars, discussions, debates, quiz etc. The students are encouraged to undertake small research projects as per the requirement of their respective study courses.
- **3.1.5** During last five years more than 15 faculty members have completed their Ph.D. degrees from different recognized universities of the country and many other have enrolled

themselves for higher research degrees like M. Phil. and Ph.D. Dr. N.L. Sharma, Principal of the college, has published a book and eleven research papers in reputed National and International journals of good impact factors such as Indian journal of Radio and Space Physics, journal of Earth System Science, Atmospheric Research, Meteorology and Atmospheric physics, Atmospheric and Solar Terrestrial physics. Dr. N.L. Sharma presented his papers in All India physics Teachers conference at Shimla, Emerging trends in Aerosols Technology & Applications at National physical Laboratory, New Delhi, on Aerosols-Chemistry-Climate interactions at Physical Research Laboratory, Ahmadabad, on Aerosols and clouds: Climate Change perspective at Bose institute Darjeeling and on Climate Change and Environment at Cochin University of Science and Technology, Kerala. Dr. Daya Nand Gautam Associate Professor from Hindi Department has attended state/national/international seminars and conferences. Dr. Surat Thakur Associate Professor in Music Department has attended 6 national and state seminars and conferences and presented his valuable research work. Dr. Surat Thakur has been honoured by national and state awards for his commendable research work in his field. Dr. Mandeep Sharma presented three papers in national/International seminar. Dr. Anup Kumar Assistant Professor of Physics Department has published 14 research papers in reputed peer reviewed national and International journals and proceedings of good Impact Factor, like Journal of Crystalline Solids, Journal of Ovonic Research, Advances in Applied Science Research, Materials Science Forum, AIP conf. Proceedings in American Institute of physics journals. Dr. Anup Kumar has presented his valuable research work in USA with special financial assistance from the Department of Science and Technology (DST) Govt. of India and chaired a session in the international conference. Apart from it, he has attended international, national and state level conferences, seminars, symposium and workshops held in India and abroad viz. at Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, Jaypee University of Engineering and Technology (JUET) Raghogarh, Guna, Madhya Pradesh, National Institute of Science Education and Research (NISER), IOP Campus, Bhubaneshwar, Orissa, Manipal University, Manipal, Karnataka, Punjab University, Chandigarh, Jaypee University of Information Technology (JUIT), Waknaghat, Solan, Indian Institute of Metals (IIM), Trivandrum, Kerala, University of Delhi, Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Bombay, Mumbai, University of Jammu, Thapar University, Patiala, Punjab and Chicago, Illinois, USA. Dr. Nirmala Chauhan, an assistant professor in the Department of Chemistry has published 14 International research papers in peer reviewed Journal having **Impact Factor** more than 3.5. The main focus of her work and studies is on "Natural polysaccharides based drug delivery systems for delivery of model drugs inside the body. She has presented her research papers in many National and International Conferences/Symposiums including her research paper entitled "Modification of psyllium polysaccharides for use in oral insulin delivery" which she presented in the "International Conference on Targeting Diabetes and Novel Therapeutics" under Diabetic Medication-2015, from September 14 - 16, 2015 at Las Vegas,

#### Nevada, USA.

Miss Priyanka Assistant Professor of English Department has published one Paper and participated in three national and international seminars and conferences and one workshop. She has also attended one international conference of *South Asian Literary Association*—"Nation and Its Discontents" at Chicago (USA) in January 2014. - **3.1.8** The institute makes the efforts in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students by organizing seminars, conferences and workshops and as guest of honor or chief guest in the college functions.
- **3.1.9** About 20% of faculty have availed this incentive and have enhanced their professional and research competence by obtaining higher degrees. Their efforts have benefited the students.
- **3.1.10** The faculty members who are involved in research share their research experiences with the students of different departments through seminars and workshops. The same is communicated to the society through the press.

#### 3.2 Resource mobilization for Research

- **3.2.1** There is no earmarked budget provided by the government and other agencies for research. The institution does not have any liberty to frame its own policies and programmes for such budgets. Hence there is no specific provision of budgetary allocation for research activities. However, some teachers have received grants from UGC/ICSSR/DST for seminars, workshops and conferences. The institute has proposed grant for research activity in college through RUSA to the tune of Rs. 1.50 crore.
- **3.2.2** There is no provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for Research. However, if the college sends proposals and if they get accepted, UGC/DST does give grants.
- **3.2.3** The college provides the facilities of free access to the internet, e-books, e-journals, library and laboratories to the students and expenditure incurred to undertake field visits is also borne by college to some extent.
- **3.2.4** There is no interdisciplinary research as such established by the institution. Now a new RUSA system has been introduced in the higher education. It has a scope of such interdisciplinary research. Proposal for same have been sent to the department for approval. .
- **3.2.5** The students and teachers have access to resources like updated labs, well-stocked advanced library and e-library internet connectivity. Library staff and laboratories staff

takes every care that optimal use of the facilities is made by students and faculty members.

- **3.2.6** The college has not received any special grants or finances from industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities.
- **3.2.7** The college recommends the research proposals of the faculty to the funding agencies and also provides access to the college infrastructure needed for execution of the project.

#### 3.3 Research Facilities

- **3.3.1** The research facilities available to the students are our well equipped Laboratories, well stocked Library and e-resources such as internet, INFLIB-NET. Students use the internet to prepare their projects, seminars and assignments.
- **3.3.2** The institution has plans to upgrade the infrastructure facilities at the campus in tune with the emerging global trends in the field of research in science and technology. The institution aims at acquiring modern equipments to enhance research facilities in laboratories. Proposals to establish conference hall and well equipment research labs to the tune of Rs. 1.50 crore has been sent to the department under present RUSA scheme.
- 3.3.3 The institution has not received any special grant from industry for developing

research facility. It does receive grant from the UGC to purchase books, journal and equipment for the departments.

- **3.3.4** The college plans for tours of students of different departments viz Science, computer, arts and Commerce to send to different institutions as well as industry in order to provide them with an exposure to the outside world and to prepare them for research related activities in further higher education.
- **3.3.5** The college does not have any special library/information centre for researchers, however, there is a common library facility with e-books, e-journals, Internet accessibility and INFLIB-NET facilities to keep the staff and students updated. The library has about 25000 text and reference books, Photostat facility, computers with internet facility, departmental book bank facility for needy students and an open access to e-books and e-journals.
- **3.3.6** The institute does not have any particular collaborative research centre but grants received from the UGC and other sources are utilized to update the infrastructure for library, laboratories, computers and instruments.

#### 3.4 Research Publications and Awards

- 3.4.1 Dr. N. L. Sharma Principal of the college has published 11 research papers in reputed journals, ten papers in conferences and one book. Dr. Daya Nand Gautam, Associate Professor, of Hindi Department, published seventeen books on different topics which have enriched the literature. Researchers can pursue further researches on related topics. Dr. Surat Thakur of Music Department has published 11 books and edited 6 books. Dr. Anup Kumar Assistant Professor of Physics Department has published 14 research papers in reputed international journals and proceedings. Dr. Nirmala Chauhan, an assistant professor in the Department of Chemistry has published 14 International research papers in peer reviewed Journal having Impact Factor more than 3.5. Dr. (Mrs.) Pankaj Assistant Professor of Journalism and Mass Communication Department has published 1 book, 3 research papers in national journals to enrich the literature in the field. Mr. Naresh Kamal Assistant Professor of Geography Department has published 6 papers in books and journals.

## 3.5 Consultancy

- **3.5.1** The college does not have any mechanism of its own to establish Institute-Industry interface as yet.
- **3.5.2** The college does not have its own policy regarding consultancy related services.
- **3.5.3** In absence of any concrete policy on consultancy services, the college does not encourage its members to go with it.
- **3.5.4** No revenue has been generated so far, as no consultancy service is being provided by the college.
- **3.5.5** As no revenue is generated from consultancy services so there is no policy for sharing the revenue.

# 3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social responsibility (ISR)

**3.6.1** Extension activities are playing an important role to promote the institutional social responsibility in our educational system through NCC, NSS and Rovers & Rangers, etc. Under these schemes villages are adopted for enlightening them about health, gender and environmental issues, etc. The college encourages the students to participate in activities like NCC (National Cadet Corps), R & R (Rover and Ranger), NSS (National Service Scheme), Literary Society Club, Youth Services, Community Service Cell and Youth Red Cross etc.. The college has two units of National Service Scheme (NSS) and four units of National Cadet Corps (NCC) and one unit of Rovers and Rangers (R&R). Various activities like adoption of

backward villages, tree plantations, polio campaigns, blood donations camps, awareness programs, Special week programs about road safety and traffic rules, regular visit under community services to villages, organizing camps for cleaning of surroundings, public places and historical temples, campus beautification, Red Cross Mela, health and hygiene, rights of women etc. take place during the entire academic session and progress report of all are summarized after Annual Camps every year. Such activities create social awareness, inculcate social values and generate a sense of responsibility among the students.

- **3.6.2** The institution tracks the students' involvement in various social movements by assigning duties to the teachers in charge and student leaders of various units like NCC (National Cadet Corps), R & R ( Rover and Ranger), NSS (National Service Scheme), Literary Society, Community Service Cell, Hostels etc. The clubs, societies and hostels in the institution encourage maximum involvement of the students in various social and national activities. A record of such activities and of the students involved is maintained by the respective incharges.
- **3.6.3** The college solicits stakeholder perception on overall performance and quality of the institution by holding meetings with Students, Parents, Students Central Association and Parent Teacher Association, Alumni and eminent persons from the area for their regular feedback and suggestions.
- 3.6.4 The institution has Community Service Cell, NCC (National Cadet Corps), R & R (Rover and Ranger), NSS (National Service Scheme), Literary Society, Hostels etc. to plan and organize the extension services. Every year, village/s is/are adopted for extension services. After conducting survey of the village/s, incharges and volunteers of various extension service units of the college plan the requisite services to the adopted village/s and pay regular visits for social services by interacting with the villagers. During last four years following four villages were adopted namely Pahnallah, Badah, Kais and Bijli Mahadev and various awareness campaigns and drives were carried out. These include Literacy, Save Envovironment, Save Girl Child, Health & Hygiene, First Aid, Rural Sanitation & Cleanliness, Drug Abuse, AIDS and Female Foeticide. Street plays are also performed to educate the villagers on the aforesaid issues. The community cell in association with NABARD helped the villagers of Pahnallah to form self help groups, to open their saving accounts and get their loans sanctioned. The college is able to establish connection with the local people and provide community services by organizing camps in the villages. In case of national calamity, the Staff and student volunteers actively participate in the relief work and also contribute to the Prime Minister's Relief Fund. Such activities create social awareness, inculcate social values and generate a sense of responsibility among the students.
- **3.6.5** In order to promote the participation of students in Extension Services, they are informed about the incentives like weightage in getting admission in higher education & job opportunities. Their services are recognized by highlighting them in the college magazine

and by rewarding them in the college annual function and by rewarding them in the college annual function. Students are also given refreshment during the extension activities. Teachers participating in these activities get additional score in their respective APIs in the annual confidential report.

- **3.6.6** Some efforts are made in this regard by the college by paying fees, remitting fees in college and hostel. However, college has not undertaken any specific social survey, research and extension work to ensure social justice for students belonging to underprivileged and vulnerable sections of the society.
- **3.6.7** Extension activities complement students' academic learning experience by providing them practical experience which helps them to develop attitude for dignity of labour, various skills like teamwork, leadership, management and communication skills. Students imbibe values like self confidence, self discipline, self respect & commitment towards work and community living & living service. The students get wonderful platform to mingle with each other and learn about culture & traditions.
- **3.6.8** In order to ensure the involvement of the community, the teachers and student volunteers go to the adopted villages and meet the public representatives and discuss the broad strategies of the extension activities to be carried out. By organizing various activities camps and interacting with people of the villages through NSS, NCC, Rovers & Rangers, PTA and Community Service Cell College is able to establish rapport with the local people and ensures their participation in community services. Various programmes are organized by the college to spread awareness about health care, energy conservation, environment protection, social equality and blood donation contribute to the community development. Blood donation camps are organized with the support of the local blood bank. Medical officers from Civil Hospital are invited to spread awareness on Health Care and HIV/AIDS Programmes organized by the college. The maintenance of water and electricity supply is ensured with involvement of IPH and HPSEB departments of the district. Volunteers work with the members of community during one day camp and seven day NSS special camp.
- **3.6.9** The college has constructive relationships with other various institutions of the locality for working on various outreach and extension activities. The Forest department helps in the plantation activities by providing saplings, the Health department helps in blood donation, cleanliness& health awareness programmes and the police department helps in maintaining discipline. Moreover, the institution also organizes workshops on disaster management in collaboration with health and fire services.
- **3.6.10** The College is appreciated by the District administration for its efforts to the collect fund for the Red Cross Society in District Red Cross Mela and by the Zonal Hospital authorities for organizing blood Donation Camps by the college. NSS, NCC and Rovers & Rangers are appreciated by the District Administration for their social community services

and the services provided by them during the International Dushahra Fair.

#### 3.7 Collaboration

- **3.7.1** Our college is an establishment of Government of Himachal Pradesh and affiliated to the Himachal Pradesh University and does not have any collaboration with any research institution. However, a few faculty members are engaged in collaborative research with the affiliating university and research centre such as PU, NPL and GBPIHED. Principal Dr. N. L. Sharma has done research work in Atmospheric Physics in collaboration with G.B. Pant institute and their results helped authorities to plan forest activities in Rohtang area.
- **3.7.2** The college has an establishment of Government of Himachal Pradesh and does not enjoy any freedom to sign MOUs/collaborative arrangements with institutions of national importance/otheruniversities / industries/Corporate at their own level.
- **3.7.3** The college has not signed any MOU for industry-institution-community interactions that contribute to the up-gradation of academic and infrastructural facilities of the institution.
- **3.7.4** High lighting the names of eminent scientists/participants who contributed to the events, provide details of national and international conferences organized by the college during the last four years.

The institution has 87 computers for the use of staff members and students which are all connected with internet facility. Overhead Projectors, L.C.D.Projectors are available so as to facilitate effective teaching and learning

In addition to above mentioned facilities students and staff members have free access to Basket ball field, table tennis court, and sports ground adjoining the campus. This sports ground has been ideally suited for hosting cricket matches, hockey, football games and athletics.

- **4.1.3** Keeping in view the requirements for the ensuing session and available infrastructure efforts are made to bridge the gaps during the lean period so that strengthening process is complete before the commencement of next session. Detail of facilities developed during the course of last four years is as under:
- (i) Year 2011-12: In the year 2011-12 the most urgent requirement of the college i.e. the Tribal Girls Hostel was completed with the help of central government assistance of Rs 219.36 Lacs benefiting the needy girl students who had to either stay outside the campus or were unable to pursue their studies because of high cost of living in the town. This hostel has a capacity of 100 students. An amount of Rs 77967 was spent on the various developmental works of the college i.e. on the renovation of students' toilets. Rupees 462922 were spent for the purchase of consumable and non consumable items including equipment for laboratories and other departments. Though, the major expenditure on computers was incurred in earlier years but some repairing work was done in this year costing Rs 1240.
- (ii) Year 2012-13: To meet the shortage of rooms caused by dismantling of most of the old building and classrooms a new building with sufficient accommodation is coming up. Library facilities were strengthened by spending Rs. 312000 on the purchase of books, journals, etc; Rs 80398 on the furniture; Rs 52056 on the installation of Photostat machine and Rs 197767 for buying computers. In order to upgrade the technology Rs 266771 was spent to install new electricity wiring in the college building's 271000 was spent to buy equipment and items for various labs .Rs 65210 was utilized in the music department to purchase new equipments and Rs 30000 were printers, Rs 1911940 was spent on the various repair work of the college campus.
- (iii) Year 2013-14: In this year, two additional rooms in science lab and one in geography lab were constructed by spending Rs 480000. Rs 304000 were spent on connecting the hostel with main sewerage line. An amount of Rs 306000 was utilized for converting Principal residence into college administrative block. Six new girls' toilets were constructed and some sitting benches were installed in the college ground for the students. An amount of rupees 136654 and 202870 was spent on college beautification and development respectively.
- (iv) Year 2014-15: An amount of Rs 467594 was spent on renovation, white wash of the college building, staff toilets, repair work of the chemistry lab and repair of water supply system of Girls Hostel. Rs 847033 was utilized to purchase various

items/equipments required in various labs .Rs 370000 was invested to install a digital library in the main library which has been enriched with eight new computers having internet connectivity benefit the college students to access 6000 e-journals and 97000 e-books.

Collapsible gate and iron frame boundary for three phase transformer at the cost of RS 66000 was made this year. Also, entire bathrooms and toilets of girls hostel were renovated at the cost of Rs 65000. A paver fitted parking place has been developed for teachers' vehicles and students' bikes at the cost of 498000. The repair of road leading to college was done at the cost of about Rs 125000 in which a drainage channel for rain water with cement concrete was made and also a retaining wall of badly damaged road was also made behind the boys hostel.

**4.1.4** No Special infrastructure facilities have been developed for students with physical disabilities.

#### **4.1.5** Residential Facilities:

Boys Hostel=01 for 75 Students with Mess facility and common room

Girls Hostel=01 for 100 Students with Mess facility and common room.

It has a common room equipped with color television connected to cable network. The mess is being run on contract basis. There is uninterrupted twenty four hours water supply. One person has been deputed for the security of boarders. Sufficient accommodation is available for hostel staff therein.

**4.1.6** District Hospital Kullu is only 100 meters away from the college campus from where students and staff members can avail medical facilities as and when required. Staff members can avail of the facility of medical reimbursement provided by the state government.

# **4.1.7** Common facilities available on the campus are as follows:

One common staff room located in the science block and separate staff rooms are available for various departments of the institution. The college canteen has adequate seating space for students and staff members. Rooms have been made available to grievance redressal cell and College Students Central Association and IQAC etc. Water tanks and water taps have been installed at various locations so as to ensure uninterrupted water supply to water coolers and aqua guards.

# 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

- **4.2.1** An Advisory Committee has been constituted for the college library. This committee comprises of senior faculty members from different streams. The committee is reconstituted in the beginning of every academic session. The committee scrutinizes the demands for new text books, magazines, journals and reference books. It also pin points the areas where improvements and modernizations are required.
- **4.2.2** College Library is housed in a separate block with two reading rooms and one digital e-library room under the supervision of one Librarian, assisted by a qualified Assistant Librarian and a restorer. Presently library has total seating capacity of 100

persons. The library remains functional on working days even during the examination days also. It opens at 10:00 in the morning and closes at 5:00 in the evening on every working day. Recently, after formation of e –library, the library timing has been increased from P.M. to 7 P.M so that students may use e –library in evening after classes. The students can sit and consult the reading material which is made available to them by the assisting staff. Students can borrow books for a period of fortnight at one instance. Library security and no dues certificate at the time of issuing of examinations admit card help as security measures for library books. The college library has also been equipped with a Photostat machine and a computer system with SOUL software.

**4.2.3** Teachers concerned are requested to submit the list of new titles and journals of importance. The library advisory committee scrutinizes the list and the librarian places the order for new titles with the permission of the principal of the college. A sum of rupees 10, 44,442 (Rs. 75024 on Journals, Rs. 969418 on books has been spent so as to purchase new books and journals during the course of last four years.

- **4.2.7** The Library staff ensures smooth functioning of the library. Besides assisting teaching staff members and students in locating the study material of their interest they ensure that proper discipline is maintained in the library reading room so that the readers enjoy congenial environment to study. Library staff also maintains the record of books issued to teachers and students. On one library card, a student is allowed to get issued two books in his/her name at a time for a period of 14 days. Library has a book bank and books are issued to the students belonging from scheduled caste/scheduled tribe categories and economically weaker sections for a complete academic session. Login passwords have been issued to faculty members and most of them have started the use of INFLIBNET facility. The library staff is taking initiatives to procure login passwords to the faculty and postgraduate students so as to enable them to make use of the latest information.
- **4.2.8** Special facilities for visually impaired and physically challenged students will be created in the college library in near future.
- **4.2.9** Teaching staff and students provide feedback to the library advisory Committee for further improvement and innovations. Suggestions for improvements and innovations are given due importance and efforts are made to introduce necessary modifications.

- **4.3.2** Faculty and students can use computers and internet facility available in the I.T. laboratory, college library and the science labs.
- **4.3.3** All the science departments and offices are computerized with internet facility and for remaining Arts departments; institution has a plan for computer networking with internet facility.
- **4.3.4** Annual Budget does not include separate provisions for procurement, up gradation and maintenance of the computers and their accessories. The college has a separate computer fund and amalgamated fund which are utilized to fulfill the aforesaid requirements.
- **4.3.5** Teaching faculty members have free access to computer projector and LCD. They often give power point presentations for the benefit of students. Students of B.C.A., B.B.A. programmes and post graduate students are required to give at least one presentation with the help of computer and projector.
- **4.3.6** The college conducts workshops in ICT for the benefit of teaching faculty. The ICT enabled classroom facility enables teachers and students to make use of on-line teaching learning resources. Students have free access to IT laboratory which enables them to enjoy independent learning by using computer and internet facility.
- **4.3.7** The college is not availing of the National Knowledge Network connectivity facility.

# 4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

**4.4.1** The Building Fund Committee, Campus Development Committee and the executive body of Parent - Teacher Association which includes advisors and technical experts ensure optimal allocation and utilization of available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of facilities like buildings, furniture, equipments and computers. Details of expenditure incurred on maintenance and upkeep of facilities are shown in the table below:

- **4.4.2** The college development committee is in place for the maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, and the college beautification committee also assists the college development committee in this work. Individual departments maintain and upkeep the facilities and equipment in their respective departments. For procurement of articles and initiating any repair work department has to seek the prior permission of the principal. All purchases by different departments are verified by the college purchase verification committee before the payment is made to the equipment or service supplier. At the end of the session, in otherwise a lean period, physical verification of all the infrastructure, facilities & equipment is done by the different physical verification committees formed by the purpose. The same committees declare whether an article is serviceable or unserviceable and recommends the unserviceable article to be written off. Then the principal constitutes a write off committee which verifies the unserviceable condition of the articles and writes off the article after auctioning or destroying it.
- **4.4.3** Service providers are called annually to carry out the calibration and repairs of the equipment and instruments.
- **4.4.4** For computers in BCA & IT, the electricity supply is made through online UPS where as all other computers are given supply through offline UPS systems. As far as the water supply of the college is concerned, the college has twenty four hour water supply connection and water storage tanks have been installed at various places in the campus including hostels.

### CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

#### 5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

- **5.1.1** The college brings out its prospectus cum handbook of information every year in the beginning of the academic session. Every care is taken to update the information contained in the prospectus and necessary changes are incorporated. The prospectus contains a detailed account of the courses being offered by the college, eligibility conditions for various courses, schedule of admissions, procedure of admission, details of fee and funds for different courses, hostel facilities, canteen facility, calendar of activities, schedule of vacation, schedule of house examinations, leave rules, conduct and discipline rules etc. The college prospectus also gives information about the departments being run by the institution and faculty and other staff members serving in the institution. Information as regards various committees for curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities is also included in the prospectus. Aforesaid information is made available in the college website also.
- **5.1.2** The Institution disburses post-10+2 scholarships to the different sections of students. The detail of scholarships distributed during the course of last four years is given below:

In addition to these scholarships, six meritorious girls were given Rs 90000 and nine meritorious girls were given Rs 135000 under Kalpana Chawla Scholarship scheme during 2013-14 and 2014-15 respectively.

- **5.1.3** About three percent students of the college receive beyond 10+2 standard scholarships from the state government
- **5.1.4** Specific support facilities available for different categories of students are as follows:
- \* The scholarships are given to the students belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, other backward classes and economically backward sections of society as per the criteria framed by the state government. Seats are also reserved for SC and ST candidates in each course.
- \* Students selected to participate in various competitions at national level are given daily allowance for a period of ten days before the departure to the venue of competition and during journey and the day when event is held. They are entitled to bus fare to and from the place of competition also.
- \* Excursions and tours are arranged for the benefit of students so as to give exposure to other institutions of higher learning, industrial houses and business concerns.
- \*College publishes its own magazine 'Devdhara' on yearly basis. Budding poets, thinkers, and writers from amongst the college students are able to give expression to their thoughts and creativity through this magazine.
- **5.1.5** Though no specialized programmes on entrepreneurial skills are organized by the institution, the career counseling & guidance cell of the college at times organizes expert lectures by eminent persons in different fields and the students get opportunity to interact with them.
- **5.1.6** So as to promote participation of students in co curricular and extracurricular activities, the college arranges intra-college competitions and prize are conferred on the winners and runner ups. Special trials are arranged for the selection of students for different cultural and sports activities. The students who are unable to attend their scheduled academic activities due to participation in co curricular and extracurricular activities are compensated by providing them guidance in extra classes and opportunity to take their CCA( minor examination and assignment work ) & missed examination.
- **5.1.7** Career Counseling and Guidance Cell gives necessary inputs to the students as regards various career competitions. Teachers also make themselves available to guide the students for different competitive exams. The college has taken an initiative to provide an opportunity to the students who are going to appear in competitive exams for entry in services. The college organized one day workshop to 70 students aspiring to enter the banking sector. The topics covered were Numerical Ability, Reasoning, Computer Awareness, English Language

- and Current Affairs. However, a system of keeping the record of number of students appearing and qualifying eligibility tests and competitive exams is yet to be established.
- **5.1.8** Academic counseling, career counseling and personal counseling services are made available to the students.
- **5.1.9** Structured mechanism for career counseling and placement of the students has not been set up in the institution as yet.
- **5.1.10** A grievance redressal cell has been set up in the institution. However, no case has been reported to this cell during the course of last four years.
- **5.1.11** A committee consisting of two senior female and two male faculty members has been constituted so as to prevent and resolve cases pertaining to sexual harassment. However, no case pertaining to sexual harassment has been reported so far.
- **5.1.12** Anti-ragging committee and anti-ragging squad have been constituted so as to check incidents of ragging. No case of ragging has been reported to the college anti-ragging committee till date.
- **5.1.13** following welfare schemes are available to the students:
- i) No tuition fee is charged from girl students.
- ii) Beyond 10+2 standard scholarships are given to meritorious students, scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, other backward classes and economically weaker sections.
- iii) Books are issued for whole academic session to needy students from the College Book Bank.
- iv) Subsidized seats have been made available to needy meritorious students in self financing courses
- v) Separate hostels for girls and boys have been made available.
- vi) N.C.C. and N.S.S. units have been set up so as to develop life skills in students.
- vii) I.T. Laboratory with internet facility has been set up so as to impart training to students in communication skills.
- viii) NSS, NCC and Rovers/Rangers units are run in college to inculcate values in them.
- **5.1.14** An ad hoc body of Alumni Association has been recently formed in the college.

### 5.2 Student Progression and Activities

- **5.2.1** Earlier, there was not any system for getting feedback from the outgoing students as regards their further studies or joining jobs. But recently such a system of feedback to have students' information through college website has been developed.

- 5.3.3 Earlier, there was no feedback system from the alumni. However, an ad hoc body of Alumni Association has been formed recently.
- 5.3.4 The college publishes its own magazine named 'Devdhara' annually. Student Editors and Staff Editors are appointed for different sections of the magazine. Interested students submit their original articles to the student editor who scrutinize & submit them to the respective staff editors. Staff editors, after final scrutiny submit it to the chief editor for publication.
- 5.3.5 So as to inculcate the qualities of leadership and make them aware of the democratic processes, a body of students is constituted by elections every year. The students' body is known as 'College Students Central Association'. It has four office bearers viz. i) President ii) Vice President iii) Secretary and iv) Joint Secretary. The C.S.C.A. has elected members as class representatives/departmental representatives. For every class of two hundred students, one representative is elected and additional class representative is elected for additional strength of up to three hundred students. A class can have a maximum of four class representatives. In addition, the principal of the college nominates twelve members to C.S.C.A. Of these 12 nominated members, three are meritorious students admitted with highest percentage in the class, two are sports persons, one student editor, one N.S.S. representative, one N. C.C. representative and one representative of cultural group. Remaining two members are nominated out of societies and clubs of the college. Earlier, the C.S.C.A. was constituted through direct elections, but as per the government direction from 2014-15, direct elections have been banned in the H P University and its affiliated colleges in the state and instead a CSCA is constituted on the basis of merit. The C.S.C.A. performs its functions under the guidance of the college C.S.C.A. Advisory Committee. A two day cultural festival is also organized by this body every year. The funds for the same are drawn out of the amalgamated fund available in the college.
- **5.3.6** Student representatives are included in Internal Quality Assurance Cell, College Discipline Committee and Anti-ragging Squad of the college, College Magazine Committee
- **5.3.7** Since, this alumni association has not yet been formed therefore there is a little communication with the old students of this college.

### CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

# **6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership**

**6.1.1**The College aims at holistic development of the students so as to make them self reliant as well as responsible members of the society. For implementing university's curriculum & ensuring the integration of the academic programmes & institution's goals and objectives the institution provides opportunities to the students to participate in the co-curricular and extracurricular activities like N.S.S., N.C.C., Rovers & Rangers, Sports and Cultural programmes. All these activities help in bringing forth the innate qualities & imbibing values among the students for their holistic development.

- **6.1.2** The Principal of the college is assisted by IQAC and the College advisory committee comprising of senior faculty, in designing and implementation of quality policy for the institution.
- **6.1.3** For the fulfillment of the stated mission, the principal holds meetings with the college advisory committee to outline and formulate plans. These plans are further discussed in the meetings of the college staff council /PTA/CSCA meetings & are finalized. Moreover, the principal of the college convenes meetings of various heads of departments and conveners of various committees to take the feedback and review the progress.
- **6.1.4** The IQAC is in place for the effective implementation and monitoring of the all policies and plans of this institution. As stated in 6.1.3 the Principal & the IQAC gathers feedback from the conveners of different activities as well as heads of various departments, review the progress and incorporate measures qualitative improvement if requested.
- **6.1.5** Heads of Departments have been authorized to formulate action plans for their respective departments. Head of each department distributes curriculum related assignments to rest of the faculty members. Each of the faculty members then frames the different stages of action plan to be implemented by her/him. The Principal also shows his quality of leadership by following up these action plans.
- **6.1.6** All the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities are carried out by different committees headed by the senior members of the faculty. The committees enjoy complete freedom of formulating and execute action plan for the respective activities. The College Student Central Association (CSCA) provides a platform to the students for grooming their leadership qualities at various levels. Students are provided with opportunities to organize tours, excursions, cultural programmes and extension activities. Apart from this the college NSS, NCC and Rangers & Rovers units are doing excellent work in development of this quality in the students.
- **6.1.7** The Principal of the college authorizes the Heads of Departments to implement action plans. They are free to formulate their own strategies for the smooth functioning of their respective departments. As mentioned in 6.1.6 various committees are constituted to accomplish various activities. Convener of each committee enjoys the freedom to form action plan for the respective committee.
- **6.1.8** Yes, the institution strongly advocates the culture of participative management. Representatives of students and staff members are given every opportunity to participate in the decision making process and execution of the action plans.

# **6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment**

- **6.2.1** The state government formulates general policy for all the Govt. institutions of the state. The college executes its action plans keeping in view the general policy of the state government. The criteria of admissions are framed by the affiliating university whereas faculty members are appointed by state government.
- **6.2.2** The institution aims at offering post graduate courses in some subjects and thus becoming a post graduate centre and introducing some self financing and add-on courses

keeping in mind the need of the local area. Therefore, the development plan of the institution lays main emphasis on strengthening the infrastructure.

**6.2.3** The head of the institution is the Principal. The college has main five streams consisting of twenty one teaching departments. Each department has it's own faculty led by senior most faculty member who takes care of all the activities of the department in coordination with the head of the institution. The college library is headed by a Librarian who is assisted by one assistant librarian, one book keeper and one attendant. All the labs have sufficient & qualified technical staff (SLA, JLA and LAs) to assist the students and teachers in carrying out the practical work. The principal is assisted in administrative matters by the ministerial staff headed by office superintendent. The ministerial staff includes one senior assistant, one junior assistant, one university clerk cum computer operator and three peons. Bursar has been appointed who assists the principal to have check and balances over the expenditure from the college funds. A senior faculty member is the secretary to the staff council assists the principal in arranging staff meetings.

The principal verifies the self appraisal reports of the teaching staff, librarian and office superintendent, writes their ACRs and submits the same to the higher authority. Likewise the office superintendent writes ACRs of the ministerial staff, the Librarian writes the ACRs of the library staff and the heads of departments write the ACRs of the lab staff of the respective departments. One of the senior faculty members (assisted by two assistant controllers and a peon) is appointed as the controller of examination who assists the principal in the smooth conduct of internal examinations and maintenance of the records there off.

# **6.2.4** Quality Improvement Strategies of the Institution:

- \*Teaching and Learning: The institution plans to set up state of art Laboratories, music rooms and smart class rooms in many departments. Training is imparted to almost all the teachers so that they are able to use latest information and communication technology for effective teaching.
- \*Research and Development: The institution intends to strengthen the infrastructure including laboratories and library so as to benefit the individual faculty/student researchers.
- \*Community Engagement: Regular camps in surrounding villages for plantation as well as for cleanliness, health, gender & literacy campaign by N.S.S., N.C.C. and Rovers and Rangers are organized and continuous interactions with the local people attract more participation of local community in extension activities of the college.
- \* Human Resource Management: The principal and the departmental heads of all departments including office superintendent and the college librarian as well as executive body of PTA take care of human resource management.
- \* Industry Interaction: The students of self financing courses are taken to the nearby industrial units to acquire the first hand knowledge of the same.
- **6.2.5** The head of the institution maintains continuous liaison with top management and stakeholders through correspondence, meetings, telephonically, e-mails and conferences so that adequate information is available to all concerned.
- **6.2.6** Appreciation of achievements and words of thanks to the faculty members keep them in high spirits and they remain motivated to continue efforts in ensuring efficiency and effectiveness of the institutional processes.
- **6.2.7** The Staff Council of the college had made a resolution last year to solve the problem of classroom shortage due to dismantling of old building by making an alternative arrangement

of classrooms in the old girls hostel and this was efficiently implemented. In addition to this College building fund committee resolved to construct parking in the college campus and that resolution was given a practical shape.

- **6.2.8** The affiliating university does not confer autonomous status on colleges.
- **6.2.9** A committee has been constituted for the purpose of redressal of grievances of students. However, no such case has been reported so far.
- **6.2.10** The institution has not filed any court case during the course of last four years. However one case was filed by Mr Krishan S/o Sh Chuman Chhantel (Nepali National) resident of Village & P. O. Jibhi The Banjar, Distt Kullu H.P. against the college in 2012 related to examination appearance of the said candidate. The Honorable Court dismissed the plaint made by the plaintiff as the candidate was not found the regular student of the college.
- **6.2.11** Yes, the college has excellent system of online feedback from the students. Under this feedback, the students have stressed that the need to introduce career oriented courses for the benefit of the students. In addition to that, students have direct access to the Principal. Sometimes they send feedback through their representatives also. Constructive criticism is always welcome and sincere efforts are made for reforms, innovations and progress.

# **6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

**6.3.1.** The college makes sincere efforts to encourage it's teaching & nonteaching staff to avail themselves of every opportunity concerning their professional development of the same. As the study leave is sanctioned by the Directorate of Higher Education, the college has its role limited to recommending the study leave of the willing faculty members. Teachers do attend the national and international seminars and conferences whenever they find the opportunity. New entrants are often sent for orientation courses and induction programme other faculty members are encouraged to attend refresher courses pertaining to their subjects.

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- **6.3.2** The training schedule is prepared by the state level training institute and staff members are sent to undergo training in different batches. New incumbents are encouraged for attending orientation/refresher/ induction programmers for self improvement on priority basis.
- **6.3.3** The state government has introduced the performance based appraisal system for the college teachers on the pattern designed by university grants commission. The new system includes performance assessment on the bases of i) teaching-learning and evaluation related activities, ii) co-curricular, extension and profession related activities and iii) research and academic contribution.
- **6.3.4** Career advancement of faculty depends on the score earned by the individual teacher on the basis of academic performance indicator. Only those who qualify standards determined through performance based appraisal system become eligible for higher pay scale or promotion.

- **6.3.5** All staff members are entitled to medical reimbursement, twelve casual leaves, thirty day earned leave for non vacation staff, and twenty day earned leave for vacation staff, leave travel concession, traveling allowance and daily allowance when engaged for specific tasks.
- **6.3.6** The college has little autonomy in respect of attracting and retaining eminent faculty. The recruiting agency for teaching staff is state public service commission. Those selected by commission are given appointment and placement by the state government. State government enjoys the privilege of transferring the staff also. The part time faculty members are engaged by constituting a committee of coordinator of the concerned department and senior faculty members and subject experts. The eligibility conditions as determined by the U.G.C. are followed strictly while engaging part time faculty.

#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

- **6.4.1** The Principal of the college has final responsibility as regards monitoring the effective and efficient use of available finances. Campus Development Committee, Building Fund Committee, and PTA body ensure proper utilization of available funds. College bursar assists the principal in managing college funds properly.
- **6.4.2** Every year, various committees are formed to have stock verification of various departments of college so as to have internal audit of all items. However, external audit is conducted regularly. The audit is conducted by Local Audit Department of Himachal Pradesh. The last audit was done from 28<sup>th</sup> Jan 2015 to 24<sup>th</sup> Feb 2015. The college has received audit report pertaining to the period 1.4.2010 to 31.3.2014. There was no major audit objection shown in the report. In addition to above said audit agency the institution engages chartered accountants for the purpose of audit of funds pertaining to self financing courses, grants given by university grants commission, P.T.A. fund and N.S.S. fund.
- **6.4.3** The institution receives major part of its income from the state government. Other sources of receipts are funds collected from students, parent teachers association fund, income from self financing courses and finances from university grants commission. The institution does not face the problem of financial deficit. The audited income, expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities and corpus available for the last four years i.e. 2010 to 2014 is as follows:

**6.4.4** The College authority made efforts to secure additional fund from the District Administration and the public representative. Under this a sum of 10 lacks and 3.70 lacks was sanctioned by the Deputy Commissioner Kullu under LADA scheme for the construction of car parking in the college campus and establishment of digital Library and also for the purchase of books in the library respectively in 2014-15. The above mentioned amount has been duly utilized for the same .

#### 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

#### **6.5.1** Internal Quality Assurance Cell

- a) Yes Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been established in the institution. The institutional policy for quality assurance encompasses continuous strengthening of infrastructure and consistent development of faculty.
- b) All the decisions, pertaining to quality assurance, taken by Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college had been approved for implementation. Most of these decisions have been implemented already.
- c) Internal Quality Assurance Cell does have two external members on its committee including a retired banker and a retired educationist.
- d) The alumni association is in the process of being formulated. The students give their feedback on the college website.
- e) The Internal Quality Assurance Cell gathers feedback from various departmental heads, librarian, office superintendent, members of PTA and the college CSCA and communicates the decisions taken by the cell to them so that they could be implemented.
- **6.5.2** Yes, the cell provides integrated framework for quality assurance, such as having group discussion with the concerned colleagues and the administrative staff for the smooth functioning of the various plans and reports of the cell.
- **6.5.3** The faculty members are encouraged to attend training programmes organized by training institute at Dharamshala, orientation courses and refresher courses organized by academic staff colleges.
- **6.5.4** Although a system for academic audit does not exist but each faculty members submits it's self appraisal report annually to the principal who verifies each entry from college records and prepares her/his Annual Confidential Report and sends the same to the higher authorities for their record and necessary action.
- **6.5.5** The college does not align any external agency for quality assurance except that it follows instructions of the state government and the affiliating university from time to time.
- **6.5.6** The Principal of the college convenes the meetings of Heads of Departments and different activities in charges regularly so as to review ongoing teaching learning process. Suggestions for improvement are discussed in the meeting of staff council before incorporating them in the process.
- **6.5.7** Quality assurance policies of the institution are communicated to internal and external stakeholders through college prospectus, website of the institution, periodic reports and annual report of the college. The outcome of the PTA meeting is also considered as a valuable feedback in this regard and the same is conveyed to the stake holders.

#### CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

- **7.1.1** Many steps are taken by the institution so that the surrounding environment is not polluted by the activities in the college. The campus beautification, cleanliness drive and plantation drive help in maintaining eco-friendly environment. Dust bins have also been kept covering different locations across the college campus.
- **7.1.2** Most of the college buildings have eco-friendly design. They are well ventilated and do not need artificial lighting during the day. All the electrical installations in the buildings are well insulated which further help in the conservation of energy. The college has a well maintained green patch which has both evergreen and deciduous trees, shrubs and ornamental plants helping in maintaining carbon neutrality. Sewage system is well connected with the sewage system of the town.

#### 7.2 Innovations

**7.2.1** Information technology laboratory has been established in the college. It has helped students and staff members in learning basics of modern information and communication skills. Computerization and installation of internet facility have enhanced efficiency and effectiveness of college office and other teaching departments. Many of the staff members and students are now able to use computer and LCD projector for power point presentations. The e—Library has been established in the college to cater the needs of students as well as teachers.

#### 7.3 BEST PRACTICES

**7.3.1** Two best practices of the college are given below:

#### Best Practice - I

- 1. Title of the Practice Departmental Seminars
- 2. Goal To train the students in various skills besides imparting knowledge to them.
- 3. Context These departmental seminars are conducted on academic, social and environmental issues.
- 4. Practice The seminars are conducted in the classrooms and teachers give the guidelines and every student is given the opportunity to give his or her presentation on a selected topic at one or the other time. As the activity is organised by the students themselves, they shed their inhibitions, come forward to express their views and interact with others and thus are trained in organisational skills, leadership skills and communication skills besides gaining a wealth of knowledge.

#### Best Practice - II

- 1. Title of the Practice Srijan (The Cultural Festival)
- 2. Goal To bring out the talent inherent in the students and to train them in organisational skills.
- 3. Context The competitive eventsviz Solo Light Classical Song, Solo Classical Dance, Ghazal, Group Song, Group Dance, Folk Song, Folk Dance, Orchestra, Skit, Mime, Mimicry, Poster-making, Mehendi, Rangoli and Quiz bring out the latent talent of the students, provides them a platform to show their creativity and also helps the institution in the selection of the students for various inter-college youth festivals organised by the HPU in the future.
- 4. Practice A 2-day festival *Srijan* is organised by the CSCA in which the competitions are held on the aforementioned items. The scrutiny of events as well as that of the competitors is done in case of events having a large number of participants. Events having at least 3 competitors or groups are selected. Faculty members are appointed for judging the items and the winners of the top three positions are awarded on the concluding day.



## Para-1 Irregular drawl of salary Rs. 7.17 lakh.

Instructions issued by the Govt. of Himachal Pradesh vide letter no. Per.(AP-3)F(10)-1/99 dated 1<sup>st</sup> May, 1999 thereafter vide letter dated 25<sup>th</sup> July 2003, addressed to all heads of Deptts, provides that salary for a Govt, servant should be drawn from the place/station where heads is actually working. Drawl of salary from a place other than the actual place of posting/working was strictly prohibited.

During test check of records it was noticed that the following Assistant Professors of the college at sr. no. 1 to 3 as given below were deputed/posted in the colleges shown against their name and were relieved off their duties on 25.07 2014 vide letter no. EDN-GCK-KLU(E-1) 2014-626-31 dated 25<sup>th</sup> July 2014 and directed to report to their new duty places. Assistant Professor at sr. no. 4 was relieved off vide letter of even file no. 939-943 dated 17<sup>th</sup> September 2014. The detail thereof is given herewater.

In reply to audit memo no. 2 dt. 13/1/15 the principal sezed that audit will be informed after consulting Director of Higher Education Himachal Pradesh. The reply of the department is not convincing as the instruction issued by the Govt. were not adhered.

Recommendations:- The expenditure may be regularized with ex-post-facto sanction of the competent authority and govt, instructions may be followed strictly while drawing salary of statt.

Para-2(A) Irregular/payment of Family Planning Allowance to Smt. Anju Rani Chauhan, Associate Professor Rs. 0.48 lakk.

As per Govt, of India order (11)(i) below Rule FR-27, Family Planning Allowance is admissible to a female Govt, servant only if she is not over 45 year of age and her husband is not over 50 years of age at the time of family planning operation. If operation is done in a private hospital/nursing family planning operation. If operation is done in a private hospital/nursing home the certificate should be countersigned by Civil Surgeon of Govt. Hospital.

Scrutiny of service book, pay bills and other relevant records it was noticed that Smt. Anju Rami Chauhan, Associate Professor had undergone tubectomy operation between 10 October 2012 to 17 October 2012 (entry at page-21 of service book) for adopting small family norms. Her age at the time of operation was 44 years but age of her husband was not mentioned and thus could not be got verified in audit. Further it was also not mentioned and thus could not be got verified in audit. Further it was also noticed that the operation was done in a private hospital (Kullu Valley Hospital) and certificate was not countersigned by the civil surgeon of the government hospital. Thus the payment of FPA @ Rs. 3,440/- per month from 01.11.2013 onwards resulted in irregular/payment of Rs. 48,160/- (Rs. 3,440 x 14 months).

In reply to audit memo no. 3 dt. 14.01.2015 the Principal stated that the age of Smt. Anju Rani Chanhan, Associate Professor was 44 years at the time of operation. The reply was not convincing as no records regarding the time of operation. The reply was not convincing as no records regarding age of husband were provided to audit. Moreover the certificate of operation produced by her was not countersigned by civil surgeon of the Govt. hospital.

Recommendations:- The age of husband may be obtained and thereafter action be taken as per rules ibid under intimation to audit.

Para-2(B) Irregular payment of FPA to Smt. Shefali, Associate Professor Rs. 0.33 lakh.

As per GIO (11)(iii) below Rule FR-27 when a Govt. officer/official undergoes sterilization operation for promoting small family norms the certificate in the prescribed form should be from a central state Govt./CGHS Hospital/clinic or other approved institution recognized by the Govt. for the purpose. If operation is done in private hospital the certificate should be signed by the Civil surgeon of Govt. Hospital and entry to this effect is also required to be made in the service book of the official.

Scrutiny of records revealed that Family Planning Allowance amounting to Rs. 33,000/-(01.01.2005 to 31.12.2014 = 120 months x Rs. 275/- = Rs. 33,000/-) was paid to Mrs. Shefali, Associate Professor without recording any entry of the family planning in the service book and without obtaining the copy of medical certificate. Thus in absence of entry in the service book and copy of medical certificate, the authenticity of payment of FPA can not be admitted in audit. The detail is as under

In reply to audit memo no. 5 dt. 15/1/15 the Principal stated that the entry of family planning operation will be made in the service book of the employee.

Recommendations:- Needful may be done now and compliance reported to audit. The copy of operation may also be furnished to audit. If operation has been done after the age of 45 years and her husband is over 50 years the recovery pointed out may be made and compliance reported to audit.

### Para-3 Excess payment in medical claim Rs. 0.11 lakh.

As per para 9.5 & 9.6 of Government of Himachla Pradesh notification no. HFW-B(F)1-1/2008 Shimla dated 21.06.2008 the rates of reimbursement for treatment taken in a empanelled institution located outside the state shall be restricted to the rates of the RKS of IGMC Shimla or Dr. RPGMC, Tanda as the case may be depending upon the nature of procedure available in these institution.

During scrutiny of medical claims it was noticed that the claims of medical tests/medicines that were got conducted/purchased in private hospital were not restricted with the rates of RKS of IGMC Shimla or Dr. RPGMC, Tanda. Thus, an amount of Rs. 16,700/- was paid in excess of the admissible rates. The detail thereof is given below. All other similar cases may be reviewed at own level and compliance reported to audit.

In reply to audit memo no. 4 dt. 15/1/2015 the Principal stated that the recovery pointed out by the audit will be recovered from the concerned.

Recommendations: Action may be taken as per orders of the Government of Himachal Pradesh and compliance reported to audit.

Para-4 Non recovery of Rs. 3,932/- due to non-return of library books.

During scrutiny of accession and issue register of library it was noticed that library books valuing Rs. 3,932/- (as per annexure A attached) were issued to the teachers and students during the period covered under audit. The students/teachers to whom the books were issued have either been transferred to other institution or left the institution after completing their studies. But the library books issued to them have not been returned to the college nor recovery has been effected so far (12/2014) which resulted in Non recovery of Rs. 3,932/-.

In reply to audit memo no. 6 dt. 15/1/15 the Principal stated that either the books will be recovered or recovery effected & audit apprised accordingly.

Recommendations:- Needful may be done now and compliance reported to audit.

### Report of the Peer Team on Institutional Accreditation of Government Degree College, Kullu, Shimla.

December 1-2, 2004

#### Section 1: Preface

The. Government Degree College, Kullu volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). A Report of self-study was submitted to NAAC. The Council after receiving the report, constituted a peer team which visited the institution on December 1- 2, 2004 with view to validate the self-study report. Dr. Latha Pillai, Advisor, NAAC was the coordinator at NAAC.

The Peer team visited departments, common facilities and support services. It interacted with the Principal, students, parents, alumni, faculty members and non-teaching staff. It also went through certain documents as provided by the college. After considering these documents and visiting various facilities and departments the report is prepared.

The Government Degree college, Kullu was established in July 1967at Kullu, a small town with a population of about 25,000 resting on the right banks of Beas River. The town is well known for its natural scenic beauty and attracts a large number of tourists from both within the country and abroad. The college provides a serene and tranquil atmosphere that is an ideal ambience for pursuing studies. It is affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University (HPU), Shimla. The college has a campus area of 5 acres. It was recognised under Sections 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act during the year 1970. It is a multi-faculty college offering courses in Science, Arts and Commerce at U.G. and English at P.G. level. The college offers Tours and Travel Management under UGC vocational courses. The subjects offered are as follows:

#### UG Level

Science ⇒ Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics and Physics.

Humanities ⇒ English, Hindi, History, Political Science, Economics,
Geography, Sociology, Public Administration, Sanskrit,
Music, Tours & Travels

Commerce ⇒ Commerce

PG Level 

English

It is fully funded by the state Government both for development and for meeting the recurring expenditure like staff salary, medical reimbursement, HRA etc. It is notable that the state Government has allowed the college to retain the Students

Amalgamated Funds. The Principal of the college is empowered to utilize the same for academic purpose like purchase of chemicals, library books etc. This is certainly a step in the right direction. During the X Plan period, the college received a grant of Rs.13.8 Lakh from the University Grants Commission. The college has taken advantage of the other schemes of the UGC like COSIP.

The college is following annual examination system, as it has to follow the rules of the affiliating university.

The college has 50 permanent teachers of whom 38 % are Ph. D. degree holders, 48 % have earned M. Phil. Degree and the remaining 14 % are PG degree holders. Thus 86 % of the faculty members have research degrees beyond P. G., which shows that the college has qualified teachers. The total number of non teaching staff is 18, out of which 10 are technical staff..

At the undergraduate level, the enrolment is 4147 of which 38 % are women and at PG level the total enrolment stands at 38 of which the share of women student is 63%. The committee noted with satisfaction that the college has been able to attract a large number of women students. All students are from the same state.

In so far as performance of the students of the last two batches, of the total students admitted at the UG level, about 35% of the enrolled students appeared at the university examination. Accordingly, the dropout rate is very high, nearly 65%. The success rate for the last two batches is 88% and 74% respectively. It compares much better than the University average. The overall performance of the students is very good.

The unit cost of college education is estimated at about Rs. 3582 pa/per student, which appears quite low compared to national average.

It has a central library, one hostel for women and one for men with capacity of 65 and 85 respectively, canteen, sports facilities to, and some welfare schemes. It has yet to establish any linkages with other institutions.

## Section 2: CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

## Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The college prepares students for B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com degree examinations and for PG in the discipline of English as per the syllabi of the HP University. This being a non-autonomous affiliating college, the college has to follow the University and Government Rules regarding restructuring of courses. The team appreciates the introduction of Tours and Travels Management as an elective course at the B.A., B. Com. level as a self-financing course having ample employment potential.

The present courses offered, such as music, zoology, chemistry etc do provide some transferable skills and have the potentiality of being career based.

Two months on the job-training programme for the students pursuing course on Tours and Travels Management is a laudable feature.

The peer team noted with satisfaction that the parents of the students are informed about the performance of their wards at college examination and attendance.

## Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The students are admitted on the basis of their academic record. The cut off mark for admission is 35% for UG in Arts and 45% in Commerce and Science. For English PG it is 45%. Also, the students who have to appear at the +2 compartmental exams are admitted. After admission, their knowledge and skill are evaluated through class test. There is provision for remedial courses for the SC/ST students but not for general students. Advanced learners are given special assignments and the teachers give them necessary guidance.

The college encourages the teachers to prepare teaching plan at the beginning of the academic session. The parent University has unitized the syllabi. Audio-visual aids and computers are used to supplement teaching. It has also established a computer center with Internet facility and in the process of Lanning. The college functions for about 240 days in a year. The number of teaching days is 142. Average workload of the teachers is about 24 periods per week.

Whereas the University conducts the final examination, the college holds periodic tests to evaluate the knowledge and skill of the students. In science subjects including Geography, internal assessment carries weightage of 10% of the total marks.

The performance of the students at internal test (House test) is communicated to them after evaluating the papers. It is noted with satisfaction that the teachers take keen interest in pointing out the mistakes committed by the students in such tests. This facilitates the students to perform well at the final examination.

The teachers are appointed through Himachal Pradesh (HP) Public Service Commission as per UGC guidelines. Being a Government college, it has no freedom to appoint temporary teachers.

Two teachers attended National seminar/conference as participants. Four teachers attended orientation programmes and three attended refresher courses. Classroom teaching is supplemented by OHP, field trips and home assignments.

The teachers are required to submit self-appraisal, which forms a part of the Annual Confidential Report. The Principal sends this to the Directorate of Higher Education after necessary endorsement. Adverse feedback if any, is communicated to the concerned teacher with a view to improve in the future.

## Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

It is noted that 38 % of the teachers have Ph.D. degree and 48 % have M. Phil degree. About 6 % of teachers are pursuing research. One teacher has registered as a part time research scholar. A good number of teachers have published their research articles in reputed journals. The teachers have not obtained any research funding from any of the donor agencies. It is natural that in an undergraduate college research interest is not a priority and transfer of teachers is an impediment in creating a research base. But the peer team is of the opinion that the research exposes the teachers to newer areas of knowledge and helps them in broadening their spectrum of knowledge, which has a symbiotic relationship with teaching. Therefore, the endeavour of the college should be to promote an ambience of research.

The college is actively engaged in outreach activities. The students are involved in a large number of such activities like Community Development, Health and Hygiene awareness, AIDS Awareness, Social Work, Medical Camps, Environmental Awareness and Blood Donation. The college has organized six blood donation camps during the year. In each camp about 30 units of blood was collected. Two teachers have been awarded for participation in blood donation camp. College has three NSS units. Incentives are given to students and teachers for their participation in its outreach activities. The students participate with Government and NGOs through National Service Programmes.

## Criterion IV :Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a total area of 5 Acres. It has plans to construct additional class rooms. The peer team noted that in absence of a composite plan and lack of funds, the campus has been developed in an unplanned manner with lot of vacant places in between different buildings. It has plans to construct additional class rooms. Being a Government College, it is maintained mostly through the Govt. grant and it is partly supplemented by PTA fund.

The Committee noted with satisfaction that the college has constituted Parent Teacher Association, Old Boys Association with a view to involve them in development of the college and mobilize funds through such Associations for augmenting the infrastructure to keep pace with the academic growth. The peer team noted that the college has mobilized resources to the tune of Rs. 8 lakhs through Parent Teacher Association for infrastructural development of the college.

School Boards, Bank Service Selection Board, IGNOU study center use the college building. The college was holding evening classes till the end of last academic session. The state Government has closed all evening colleges from the current session. During vacations, the college hostel provides accommodation to the students of nearby engineering college students who come to the town for practical training.

The college has a Gymnasium within the campus. There are plans to have Basket ball and Volley ball grounds in the campus. Due to lack of space within the campus, track events and field games are organized at nearby Dhalpur ground. Last year 24 students participated at the Sate level sports meet in which the college bagged two silver and a bronze medals. Ten students participated at National Sports Meet.

In addition to sweepers and gardeners, Teachers, NSS Volunteers and NCC cadets join hands in keeping the college campus beautiful. The maintenance of the campus is excellent and the ambience is conducive for an academic atmosphere.

There are about 17,600 books in the library and there is an advisory Committee for the library. Steps are being undertaken to computerize the library. During last two years, the library grant was about Rs. 28,000 and Rs. 39,000 respectively. During last two years, 477 textbooks, 34 other books have been added to the library. It subscribes to\ 19 magazines / periodicals and 9 Newspapers. The library remains open for six days in a week from 10 AM to 5 PM. The library is equipped with reprographic facilities

It is noted that the college has initiated central computing facilities and four Pentium IV PCs have been installed at the computer center with Internet facility. Three departments have also computers. Health services are available to students and staff from the local Government Hospital that is at close proximity of the college.

There are two hostels within the campus, one is for boys and one for girls. Provision of residential facilities to girls in this semi-urban area with hilly terrain has facilitated them for access to higher education. The hostels are well maintained. The common rooms of all the hostels have adequate facilities.

#### Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The dropout rate is very high in the first year. This is mainly due to departure of students to professional courses and jobs in the industrial units. The compartmental students also leave the college in the middle of the session. The average success rate of UG candidates at the final university examination is about 80 % that is well above the university average in most of the subjects.

The college does not have any mechanism to keep track of students' progression to higher studies or their success rate at different categories of entrance /qualifying tests.No data is available for professional examinations like CSIR, NET, SET, TOEFL, GRE and GMAT. The college does not have a feed back mechanism from the students.

The prospectus of the institution is well documented. It specifies the admission policies, rules and regulations of the college, courses offered, and fees structure including hostel fees and deposits. It is published annually and given to prospective candidates along with admission form.

The peer team appreciated the active participation of the parents in the activities at the college. During the meeting of the PTA with the peer team, they suggested the introduction of new courses, which have relevance to the local need. They also assured their active support to the development programmes of the college.

Although personal and academic counselling is done by teachers and through seminars, it needs to be strengthened and revamped within an institutional design. There is a provision for award of Merit-cum-Poverty Scholarship besides scholarships are given to SC/ST students enjoy scholarship. Some scholarships are also provided through IRDP by the college. Rotary Club also provides financial assistance to the economically deprived meritorious students.

#### Criterion VI: Organization and Management

The college does not have an internal coordinating or monitoring mechanism. The Principal and the Superintendent supervise the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff. There are a large number of internal Committees to assist the Principal in management of the college. The college follows the directives from the State Government and provides feedback to the same for necessary action. It has not attempted to impart professional training programme to the non-teaching staff as a result of which they are not familiar with modern management techniques.

The current tuition fee at the UG level is Rs. 600/- p.a. In addition, the students are required to pay Library fee, Laboratory fee and other fees. Girl students are exempted from paying tuition fees. The tuition fees have been revised from from Rs 144/ p/a to Rs600/-

The State Government grant takes care of the salary, T.A., office expenses and medical reimbursement. The principal is empowered to utilize the Students Amalgamated Fund for purchase of chemicals, consumables, library books, furniture etc. Out of the Govt. grant nearly 95% goes towards salary. The college

has an excess budget in the sense that it has earned some revenue out of the Students Amalgamated fund, which is used to meet emergency expenditure. The college accounts are audited by Local Fund Audit and Accountant General of Himachal Pradesh.

There is a grievance redressal cell in the college. It is suggested that the college may immediately start a women cell in which a senior lady faculty member may be appointed as the chairperson.

## Criterion VII: Other Healthy Practices

The internal quality check covers assessment of students through periodic tests and house tests. The parent university provides refresher course and orientation course to the faculty members. Value based education is imparted through curricula which incorporates healthy national practices. Civic responsibilities are inculcated by organizing awareness camps as well as through classroom teaching.

For all round development of the personality of the students, they are encouraged to participate in debates, interaction with teachers and participation in cultural and sports activities. Community orientation is imparted through the NSS activities.

The students Association play a dominant role in maintaining academic discipline, cultural activities and a clean environment. Good leadership and harmonious atmosphre among the teaching staff, non teaching staff and students has helped smooth functioning of the college.

The peer team appreciates the activities undertaken by the NCC, NSS units and Sports department. It is a notable achievement of the college NCC wing to have trained its cadets who have been qualified for defence service. One girl student of the air-wing of NCC has been selected as a flying officer and another girl student has been qualified for army ordnance service.

#### Section 3: Overall Analysis

After going through the self study report, the information provided at the time of interaction with the principal and after visiting various academic and infrastructure facilities as well as discussion with teachers, students and parents, the pear team noted all the academic practices of the college with satisfaction. The percentage of success rate is much higher than the University average among the students who appear at the University final examination. The College caters to the needs of the rural and backward districts of Mandi, Kullu and Lahoul-Spitt the. The Peer Team would like to commend further on the following aspects:

- The percentage of success of the students at University examination is above 65 % in most of the subjects. In some subjects it is almost 100 %. In general, the college pass out percentage is more than that of the University average.
- The teachers organize a month long House test for the students prior to their university final examination to instill confidence in them. Besides the college also conducts unternal test to evaluate students.
- 3. The college imparts remedial courses to SC/ST students.
- Through NSS and NCC the students participate in a large number of Community Development programmes.
- The students also participate with Govt. and NGOs in community development work.
- 6. The Government of HP has to be complimented for allowing the Principal to retain Amalgamated funds of the students and utilize the same for various academic, co-curricular and cultural activities as well as for purchase of books, furniture and consumables.

- The campus is generally free from student indiscipline and the ambience is excellent for serious studies.
- Students participate actively in sport, cultural activities, debate, discussion etc. and have received large number of awards.
- The teachersa are highly motivated and participate in academic and co-curricular activites.
- 10. The peer team noted the existence of a canteen built during 1996 with the donation from the local community under the scheme "Vikas Mein Jan Sahayog".
- 11. The Peer team noted with satisfaction that the college has mobilized funds to the tune of Rs. 8 Lakh through the Parent Teacher Association, which is laudable.

The peer team noted certain areas of concern and would like to brings them to the notice of the college authorities:

The areas of concern are as under:

1. Being an affiliated college, it has no flexibility in redesigning of courses or to introduce innovative courses by keeping the market force in view. The college may take up this issue with the university and the courses need to be restructured keeping the job market in view. Some vocational courses may be introduced to make the learners self-reliant. It may be a good idea to introduce few certificate/diploma courses, which may be self-financing. For example, spoken English, communication skill, personality development, hotel management skills certificate course are very much required for the region.

- The drop out rate is quite high and this adds to unit cost of education. The college may consider of conducting an aptitude test for selection of students to different courses.
- The library needs to be computerized and may be kept open after college hours.
- The college may consider of assigning project work to the final year students. Importance has to be given to interactive learning
- Since the college caters to the needs of the students of the rural and tribal area of the state and as some of the students are first generation learner, there is an urgent need to strengthen the Students Guidance Cell and Placement cell.
- Complete automation in the areas of administrations, accounts, admission and examination processes should be encouraged.
- There should be a mechanism for internal audit, both academic and financial..
- The administrative staff should be sensitized to modern management practices and training programme for them be organized.
- In an age of information explosion, exposure of students to computers and Internet cannot be overlooked.
- 10. The college should set up a women cell.
- To promote research and in the interst of the students the transfer policy may be more rational.

 The college departments must try to get financial assistance from various schemes of the UGC.

13. Remedial courses for academically weaker students should be introduced and there should be appropriate mechanism to provide special coaching to advanced learners.

14. There may be curriculum audit in each subject to provide a feedback to the affiliating university.
